has been developing luxury projects for the very wealthy for over 20 years. Now he is working with another company to fulfill their new needs Needs for BEAUTIFUL SUSTAINABILITY. He told "Luxury Living" what is possible, what people are willing to pay more for and where the willingness to compromise ends.

Last year, the 47-yearold founded another company: With Valouran, he now wants to address customers whose need for sustainability is as great as their wealth - and has already started projects with a volume of over one billion euros the pipeline. Luxury Living spoke to Alex Michelin about when this clientele is ready to cut back and/or pay more. And where the unwillingness to compromise ends among those who are not used to compromise.

The ultra-rich have not been known for placing particular emphasis on sustainability in their real estate portfolios, to say the least. Why are you now focusing on the combination of very luxurious and sustainable?

You're absolutely right, that wasn't an issue at all until a few years ago, but now the first three questions always revolve around sustainability, and the ultra-rich [people who have assets of more than 30 million US dollars/around 27 million euros, note] are extremely concerned about their carbon footprint. These details may not ultimately make the difference.

In every project we work on, one of the most important goals is to maximize energy efficiency and reduce carbon emissions. to minimize sions. The EPC rating therefore plays

an important role in the very first development phase in order to achieve the best possible values. We also use recycled materials wherever possible, such as reclaimed wood, unless it's a super-modern design concept. All demolition materials in our renovations are either reused for example the bricks - or, wherever possible, recycled. So that they can be used again for other purposes, for example in road construction. However, one has to be honest enough to say that the very wealthy do not want to live exclusively with recycled materials. The desire for one

If you don't want to go without air conditioning, it's important for you to run it with the lowest possible footprint and from renewable energy sources, regardless of whether you have to pay more for it. For example, all of our projects are equipped with heat pumps, and in some we also build our own buildings with energy storage systems - which also makes the residents independent of the general power grid. Such investments pay

It only takes 15 to 20 years to pay off, but buyers are absolutely willing to pay more for it.

Are these buyers after such investments then ready to live accordingly in the little things of

This is naturally difficult for us as developers

to understand. Most likely when hotels are also operated in our projects, such as in our Finchatton project "The Whiteley", which we are currently implementing in London. This is where we strive

On the other hand, a "Breeam Outstanding" certification [the highest sustainability award level of at least 85 percent, note]. Our tenants there will also include a Six Senses Hotel, which is known for not using plastic bottles and for attaching great importance to a sustainable concept. e
